Every year, people open their homes to children in need – and they don't all have fancy houses or graduate degrees. What they do have is 100% Heart.









Recent 2022 data shows, on any given day in Ohio, nearly 15,000 children are being cared for away from their parents. About 4,000 of those children are placed with a relative or family friend.

Roughly 8,500 of them are living with foster parents. The remaining children are in residential care or another placement setting. More than 3,400 children are waiting to be adopted.



VIRTUAL TRAINING

Properly installing and using a car seat can significantly reduce the risk of injury and death in the event of a car accident. Social workers, parents, caregivers, and childcare providers can play a critical role in ensuring that families are using car seats correctly, which can ultimately save lives. Many families may not have access to resources or information on car seat safety, so social workers and caregivers can fill this gap and provide families with the necessary information and resources to keep their children safe.
